Transmitted Chooks

When Friends of Flora (FOF) needed a few large birds to practise attaching transmitters to their legs then who else to call upon but Coralie Grooby with her much loved and friendly chooks.

The Great Spotted Kiwi translocated to the Flora valley have transmitters on their legs so that they can be located with telemetry gear at any time. It also allows trackers to study their movements and hours of foraging which can indicate if they are sitting on eggs. The transmitters hold 2 weeks of data so every 2 weeks FOFers walk the best 'listening ridges' to receive each kiwi's data. The transmitters run on batteries that last approximately 1 year. So once a year (Feb/ March) the kiwi are tracked to burrow, caught and their transmitter batteries changed.

This is no easy task and a person must observe quite a few changes before actually doing it. Practise is also required. One can practise on a broomstick but this is rather static and fails the reality test. Chooks are the next best bet. Coralie selected her finest chooks who behaved admirably whilst bands were clicked on and liberally taped to their legs above the hocks. So now FOF has 2 more partially trained transmitter battery changers.

NB. Any tools and clothes that come into contact with chooks must be either changed or sterilised because of the likelihood of any bird disease transfer to kiwi.

TIP: the best place to hear kiwi at night is from Mt Arthur hut. At this time of year they are coming out of their burrows just after 9pm and going back to bed at approx. 6am.
