Atamai Village to Hold Open Day

Here in the Motueka Valley, Hemon and Katie Dey are watching their house take shape in Atamai Village. This couple, with two young children, reassessed their Christchurch lives a few years ago. Realising the likelihood that future scarcity of fossil fuels would threaten industrial food production, they wanted greater control of that aspect of their family lives. Plus, they wanted their home-schooled children, Alysha, 5, and Jordan, 3, to have a more rural experience. Hemon and Katie considered a lifestyle block and judged that the isolation would be less favourable to the children. On Google they discovered Atamai, a community with the same goals they had created. Atamai Village, in the setting of thwe beautiful and bountiful Motueka Valley, drew them to the top of the south.

Hemon already worked from home as an electronics engineer for a Christchurch firm, so geographic transfer was little problem. Katie had interrupted her career as a data analyst to have children. Katie experiments with cheesemaking, knitting, sewing, crochet, flaxweaving, soapmaking and leatherwork. She found that people in Christchurch undervalued these skills, whereas here people are interested in sharing her moves towards self-reliance, especially growing food. Katie and the children help with the Atamai food box scheme one afternoon a week, delivering fresh fruit and vegies to villager's doors.

The family moves around on foot or bicycle whenever possible, with a trailer for the children. In a recent Atamai survey of fossil fuel use, this family was impressive for its low consumption. They look forward to the time when they can share the use of a car, rather than owning one. When Hemon and Katie were at the point of erecting the solar panels on their house, a village working bee was called. About a dozen helpers, ranging from children to grandparents, got the job done speedily. Working bees also help maintain the extensive Commons area of the village.

If you are curious or have been wondering what the earthworks and construction activity is about, come see for yourself. Atamai Village will have an Open Day on Sunday, October 6th, 11am to 3pm. The villagers welcome all of our Mot Valley neighbours. Tours of several eco-houses and Permaculture-planned gardens and orchards will be available, alongside a barbecue, nibbles and some activities for the children. The village is on Mytton Heights Road, off Motueka Valley Highway.

In the newsletter from the Motueka Valley Association you were reported as saying that Tasman District Council ("TDC") has been "work-shopping the plethora of rural issues" and will release a "discussion and options document" to Council on 15 August. See Attachment as reported in the Association's last edition of its Newsletter

TDC has obligations as an administrator of statutes to embrace the principle of 'subsidiarity'[1] (i.e. bottom-up stewardship as part of people's *rights in their property*[2]) as one of a number of steps towards taking all possible steps to avoid the taking of regulatory powers. (Refer to LAC Guidelines[3] and constitutional and administrative law principles[4].)

Getting a community to define rural sectoral issues clearly and with appropriate weightings and priorities is at the core of considering the taking of any statutory powers or steps in that sector.

Therefore first garnering a community's views on definitions of those issues and ideas on how they might be most efficiently and economically addressed (desirably, without recourse to statutory interventions) is arguably an essential and first step towards effective communication between a statutory administrator and the people who that administrator is supposed to serve (also known as the bottom-up approach to administration).

It is arguably inappropriate for an administration to cook-up its 'top-down' listing of issues and proposed actions in secretive 'closed workshops' from the perspective of an administrator and then foist that result upon people as a fait accompli-then claim that such a 'process' is 'appropriate consultation' because people have been given one or two chances to react to the position already adopted by the administrator.

Federation for Advancement of Community Self-Sufficiency ("FACS") seeks to work with TDC to effect change of this 'top-down' approach; FACS sees this as beginning with a training for planners and Councillors in Constitutional and Administrative Law and the introduction at the core of the organisation of the principles and guidelines contained in the LAC Guidelines which were created to guide statutory processes undertaken by the whole of government.
