Two defibrillators have been purchased for

our community

After the public meeting in Ngatimoti Hall on March 18th a group of 9 volunteers met again on 26th March and formed the Motueka Valley Defibrillator Group.

This group consists of: Glen Davenport (Secretary/Treasurer); Gloria (Chairperson) and John Anderson; Diana Wood; Linda Sillery and Norman Carrington; Jenny Green; Ian Thorn and Stuart Granger.

The Group has applied to become a registered charity and is awaiting approval from the Department of Internal Affairs.

Since our last update in the Motueka Valley Newsletter we have had several more very generous donations from members of the community, as well as a \$500 donation from the Motueka Valley Association, which put us in the position to be able to purchase 2 Defibrillators (AED) – one will be located at the Ngatimoti Rural Fire Station and one will be installed at the workshop of Kerry Hall near the Baton Bridge.

A group of about 20 community members have volunteered and will be trained in CPR and the use of the defibrillator (AED) and will be called upon to provide the machine in case of an emergency. These machines will be located in boxes so that if a community member or the public needed them they can access them..

Bridge Realignment

You may have read the article in the local paper of the TDC's decision to re-align and rebuild the narrow bridge down river from Ngatimoti hall. This project has been in the TDC's 10 year plan. The bridge is now "well past its use-by date" and considered to be top of the list for bridge replacement especially as the work will attract a 59% subsidy (which may drop to 51% in 2 years time). The project is estimated to cost \$700,000 from the 2014 and 2015 budget (including the cost of any land purchase that may be required.)

MVA was surprised to hear of the plan via the media and was concerned that the 'driving force' for the work seemed to be the transport industry's (not residents') demands. Presently the bridge can take 44 tonnes, the new bridge would be able to carry Big Rigs up to 62 tonnes. Concerns include increased road damage and the ongoing cost of it to the ratepayers, building a bridge on an ex rubbish tip, inviting increase of speed on an icy corner and generally questioning the urgency of such a project in times when the TDC is asking us to cut projects to enable a lowering of the Council's debt.

Councillor Trevor Norriss will be at the MVA meeting to give background to the above decision and answer any queries from local residents.

Jill Knowles

As I bike up Jill is sitting basking in the sun infront of the 1912-built Knowles family home at Pangatotara with prime views of the recent heavy snowfall on Mount Arthur. She's 98 years old,



was bowling at the Ngatimoti Bowling Club until last year ("when the bowl doesn't reach the other end of the pitch it's time to give up") and is still getting used to being carless she sold her Mit-

subishi 6 months ago. But there are many rich and long memories of valley life.

Jill came to Pangatotara in 1943. She'd been working at the Hermitage at Mt Cook and was engaged to be married. But "the war bust everything up." Her fiance never came back and travel restrictions meant no tourists so she lost her job. Hearing about tobacco work in the Motueka valley Jill and a girlfriend travelled north and became tobacco pickers for the Knowles. "The whole valley was tobacco. I loved working outside in the sunshine." She describes a life of living in a workers' bach and the variety of jobs involved in tobacco farming. There were many women workers but at harvest time male workers were brought in from Australia and the Islands. The farms would share workers so they'd all work together on harvest days on different farms. And Jill married the Grower.

Later the government subsidised the halt of tobacco production as it was deemed harmful to health and the valley farmers searched for other crops. Strawberries, peas and beans, pumpkin and corn were grown for Kirkpatricks canning. Jill and Francis lived with their 5 children in a bach - the 3 daughters all now live in the North Island but the 2 'boys' are still local identities - Lloyd's timber machining shop and Trevor's mill. The family later moved into 'Grandad's house' which was well known for its "Big Room," the place for lots of people; workers, neighbourhood and family. "Gosh there used to be a crowd of us."

I asked Jill if she'd show me the Big Room. The laughter, games and fun still resonated. "In the dark we'd pass around things like raw meat, or pine cones or a cow's skull with horns and that'd make them shriek." The room is spacious, light (french doors and long bay windows with seats), has comfy chairs and a piano. This room also functioned as a gallery in recent years. Jill's an artist and used to sell her paintings from here. There are only a few left and she won't sell those. The landscapes - mostly oil but some watercolour - bring some of our classic scenes into the Big Room - Molesworth, Wanaka, Lindis Pass, Motueka Valley, mountain slopes and river valleys. They're beautiful. Jill doesn't paint anymore "the paints dried up."

Jill now lives alone in Grandad Knowles' house but is surrounded by other Knowles families (locally known as 'Knowlesville') so she keeps up with all the family news. Trevor drives her to Motueka to do her shopping and most days she walks down to Lloyd's machining shop to chat with them. She used to mow all the lawns. Today she sits watching the sheep grazing under the fruit trees. "I've got plenty to do but I don't always do it."
