Get ready to take on strangling vines

The leader of Project DeVine, Chris Rowse inspired valley residents to begin progressive control of pest vines like old man's beard and banana passionfruit.

As a result of the meeting on April 13, the first working session to deal with old man's beard will be at **9.30am** on Saturday May 14 at Lisa Hood's property at 2184 West Bank Rd. This will be followed by a pot luck lunch and a meeting to form a core group to take the project forward.

Chris shared some the project's history and funding options. Speaking to 28 residents, he discussed the various funding streams. Organising pest management as a community endeavour enables funding, he said.

He suggested applying to the Motueka Community Board and other sources of grants. Project DeVine will sell Glyphosate at half the wholesale price to the valley group when it is formed.

He said it's important in this "endless work" with pest vines to keep records of vines killed on each property. Chris brought a spreadsheet and suggested that someone from DOC or Project DeVine guide the working bees. These should be publicised as widely as possible he said. "Start a campaign – maybe with the Richmond folk to have old man's beard and banana passionfruit put on the control list for ALL the Tasman district – new process on the Regional Pest Management Plan," said Chris.

"Clean up the areas of higher botanical value, like QEII covenants and involve TDC – to clean up their reserves. Invite councillors and community board members to assist," he said.

Young and old members of the Ngatimoti community paid tribute to the fallen in overseas' wars on the 100th Anzac Day. The Motueka Returned Services Association's service and wreath laying ceremony was well supported by the Motueka Brass Band and members of the armed forces.

Squadron Leader Andy Anderson spoke of those who had left New Zealand for a big adventure, to see the world.

"Many of them are still there. Warfare had been industrialised on a never-before-seen scale. Most New Zealanders who returned did not want to talk about it. Today we remember those who came before us who gave us the comfortable life we have now," he said.

Life is precious—your life or one of your loved ones' lives might be saved by an AED

After a year of fund raising by the Pokororo Women's Club, \$6300 was raised and two defibrillators (AED) purchased from the Red Cross.One is located at the Ngatimoti Fire Station and one at the entrance to Kerry Hall's Engineering Workshop at the Dovedale turnoff. A Motueka Valley Defibrillator Group was formed as a registered charity in order to raise funds for ongoing maintenance of the AED which includes replacing specialised batteries, pads and ongoing training of community members in CPR. The group would also like to see an AED on the West Bank of the river so will be moving towards fundraising for another AED.

A group of local community members have volunteered to learn CPR and the use of the AED. On Wednesday, June 8th at 7:30pm at the Ngatimoti Community Rooms (at the Fire Station) the Red Cross will hold another CPR course which includes the use of the AED. 
