Motueka Valley Business Profile

Portrait Commissions - Ellen Urselmann

As a young woman in Amsterdam, Ellen Urselmann put aside her desire to go to Art School to follow a more financially stable path. Like many creative people, her passion and interest could only be ignored for so long. She eventually went to Art School in the evenings as an adult student. There she was able to focus on painting and printmaking.

Diploma completed, she created a studio in the north of Holland in Friesland where she enhanced the skills she had been taught, developing her own methods and style. Her fascination with the human face led her to specialise in portraits. For these she usually works in oil paint, pastels, or charcoal, taking varying amounts of time to complete a commission to her satisfaction.

The preparatory stages of the commission involve meeting two or three times in the subject's own environment, observing, sketching and engaging with them in order to gather the information she requires. Initial planning of the format is negotiated with the client, but Ellen usually decides on composition and colour as she takes the painting from ideas and sketches to the canvas. During her initial visits she also takes photographs from many angles and in different lights for reference as the work develops. Once she has the information she needs to begin, she works in her studio in her house above the West Bank Road, where she has lived for the past four years. This room has wonderful light and provides the peace Ellen needs to focus on the work.

It was a pleasure to talk with Ellen about her art practice. She is clearly passionate about her work and spoke about her desire to capture the essence of the person being portrayed, as well as a physical likeness. Ellen has embraced Qigong as an important part of this process, the results evident in the work she currently has on the easel. Having painted the subject twice previously, a comparison of the works shows how she has captured the change within him over time.

While her portraits are worked in oils, she also works in charcoal, pastels and acrylic paint. I was impressed that the charcoal studies she uses when developing her paintings also capture the essence of the subject.

Ellen is available to teach art and Qigong.

Ellen's work is a testament to her talent and to the focus and commitment she has made to develop her skills to a high level.

Learn About Wasp Control

Wasps can be a major nuisance in our region over late summer and autumn, but there is now a tool available to provide wide-scale control. Richard Toft, insect ecologist and the developer of Vespex, has offered to talk to people interested in controlling wasps in the valley. When used correctly, Vespex is very safe for the bees and birds, but devastating to populations of introduced social wasps. There is no need for you to find the wasp nests in the bush, because the wasps do the hard work themselves and take the bait back to their nests. Come along to learn more about Vespex, techniques for getting the best results, and avoiding common issues. There will be time at the end for Richard to answer any waspy questions you have.

Controlling Old Man's Beard in the Motueka Valley



The TDC is calling for submissions in respect of the Proposed Tasman/Nelson Regional Pest Management Plan 2017.

Old Man's Beard is already in the Regional Pest Management Strategy as a progressive control pest in Golden Bay/Riwaka and Upper Buller districts.

To encourage Valley residents to make submissions for the Motueka River Valley to also be included in the Regional Pest Management Strategy, the MVA has circulated a flyer that includes a submission form.

Sending the submission form to the TDC will show evidence of community support. Sending in the form will help ensure that Old Man's Beard is brought under control in the Motue-ka Valley.

Submissions close on 15 December 2017.

Coming Home

It was my intention, as the new reporter to the Motueka Valley Association newsletter, to set up a series of interviews with members of the Motueka Valley community and to have the first of these ready for publication for this newsletter. It is still my intention to do this, but it won't be this month. As Cervantes' wrote in Don Quixote, "Diligence is the mother of good fortune; and the goal of a good intention was never reached through its opposite, laziness." Now, I'm not saying that it's been a lazy November. It certainly hasn't. But somehow the days have passed, the appointments haven't been made, and the writing hasn't been done. Not exactly the diligence I was hoping for. Next year, perhaps. No, definitely. I have my first target selected.

So, what to write when you haven't done what you hoped? Part of our November included a trip to Christchurch, Dunedin, and on to Wanaka. As we drove, I thought about what I might write in lieu of an interview, composing sentences and paragraphs as the kilometres clicked past and the splendour of the land unfolded before me.

The South Island is a breathtakingly beautiful place with the drama of soaring mountains, cascading rivers, rolling hills and the grandeur of big skies. It's my home. For most of my life Canterbury was home. I tried Auckland once, but only felt that I could breathe again once the ferry reached Picton. I wondered, when we decided to move to the Motueka Valley how long it would take before it felt like home, for it to feel familiar.

It's too soon for that yet, but I know that this is where I want to be. Rather than driving through towns and wondering what living there might be like, I looked and knew that we had chosen the right place.

Our valley is dramatic too, but softer than many other places. The road that winds through it contains surprises around each corner as the seasons change. We're coming into summer and with it the campervans to take in the beauty of our place. The trees are in full leaf, and there is no need for caution on shaded corners. The swimming holes are welcoming the daring. Swallows are dancing over the river seeking their food, the tui are bossing all the other birds in the garden away from their selected flax flowers. The sandflies are out and about looking for bare ankles. Hops wind their way up the strings. Even the cursed broom drowns the hills in vibrant yellow. This is a good place to call home.

I want the interviews and articles in this newsletter to be a celebration of the place we have chosen to live. I want to know how people relate to the land, the environment, the river, and the others in the valley. If you want to tell me your story about living here, I'd love to hear it. It's our home, after all.


