Summer in the Valley



Keeping Our Valley Beautiful

To those who cycle or walk our roads there are little treasures to delight the senses. Overhead the sound of a kereru in flight draws the eye upward; the smell of a eucalyptus tree in the heat of the day reminds us of other places; roadside weeds are alive with insects and draw us into their world.

This close observation also reveals things that are not so delightful. Discarded cans, plastic bags, hunks of polystyrene and all manner of rubbish lie on the sides of the roads in our valley.

A neighbour's three visiting grandchildren in the valley took it upon themselves to gather all the rubbish they could find beside a one kilometre stretch of road in Ngatimoti. By fossicking in grass, bushes and fence lines they gathered three large bags of rubbish, presumably discarded by people as they pass through. Vespex[®] Workshop

Concern for the health of bees and other beneficial insects, and about the increase in the wasp population prompted the Motueka Valley Association to host a workshop run by Nelson insect ecologist Richard Toft, the developer of the Vespex® wasp bait. On Saturday January 20th twenty-five valley residents gathered at a property on Herring Stream Road to hear Richard explain wasp habits and how Vespex® has been developed with understanding of these habits to target the Vespula wasp species. In New Zealand, this includes both the common wasp (Vespula vulgaris) and German wasp (V. germanica).

Vespex® is a protein bait attractive to wasps with a potent, but slow-acting insecticide. As it is not sugar based, it does not attract bees and other species. The bait is taken to the nest by the worker wasps, and shared with the colony, causing the nest to collapse rapidly. Having low toxicity to mammals and birds, the bait, when used correctly, has minimal impact on anything other than the targeted species.

Richard answered residents' questions, providing detailed information to alleviate concerns and misunderstandings. Some groups of neighbours began discussing coordinating a baiting programme for maximum impact.

It was a privilege to listen to someone as knowledgeable and informed as Richard. With the wasp season upon us it is encouraging to know that a locally developed product is available to deal with the problem.

No spraying on your road frontage

The TDC invites residents to request that their rural property frontage not be chemically sprayed and instead undertake the vegetation control themselves.

An application form to be included on the Council's No-Spray list is available at www.tasman.govt.nz/transport/ roading/roading-policies-permits/roadside-spraying/ or at the Council's local service centres. On approval, the Council marks the no spray area with red marker pegs.

To prevent unwanted spraying, the pegs need to be positioned on your property frontage to mark it as a no-spray property so that can be clearly seen from the road.

Rural residents who choose the "no spray" option must control the vegetation growth along their property frontage to ensure road users are not impeded and all roadside signs and markers are clearly visible. Vegetation height should not exceed 300mm. Any storm water drainage ditches need to be kept clear of excess vegetation. At intersections vegetation must be kept well clear to ensure good sight lines for traffic using the intersection.

"Jill" Eileen Ethel Ellis Knowles 1916-2017

Longtime Motueka Valley resident Eileen Ethel Ellis Knowles - better known as "Jill" - passed away 20 November at the age of 101. Beloved mother, grandmother, great grandmother, landscape artist, friend, and bowls enthusiast Jill always had a ready laugh and kind word.

Born in Dunedin 6 April 1916, Jill lived on a dairy farm at Kaikorai Valley. In 1921 the family relocated to Dunedin. After graduating King Edward Technical College, Jill worked at Ross and Glendenings sewing garments for display and shop windows. In 1939 she was engaged to Robert Francis Dyer, who died in 1941 when the HMS Neptune was mined. Jill worked at Mt. Cook before moving to Motueka to work in the tobacco fields. She married the boss- Francis Harris Knowles and together they had five children: Juliet, Doreen, Valerie, Trevor and Lloyd. Francis is the one who dubbed her "Jill" as his mother was also called Ethel.

Jill's daughters live on the North Island; the sons run their own timber business in Pangatotara. Francis passed away in 1989. Jill leaves behind a legacy of 5 children, 12 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren.
