NEXT MVA MEETING

Roger May, on behalf of Steve Olds (chairman of Water Information Network Inc. (WIN)), writes WIN is a group of Tasman ratepayers who are concerned about the proposed Waimea Dam. We are contacting all ratepayer associations in the region seeking their help and cooperation.

You will be aware that the Tasman District Council continues to push the proposal to build a 'community' dam. We have grave concerns about this proposal - the rationale, the costs and the risks to ratepayers as well as the TDC consultation process.

It is clear that there is already more than enough water for public urban and residential use and that commercial irrigators are creating the water shortages and impacting on river flows.

Under the current TDC proposal, the large water users get to utilise 69.9% of the dam's capacity but pay only 48.9% of the capital costs. WIN estimates that 85% of the pumped water will go to irrigators. Furthermore, the ratepayer's contribution includes the cost of dam capacity in order to maintain minimum river flows. In reality, the Council has inflated the public's need for urban/residential water in order to justify a greater portion of the dam's costs to ratepayers.

What's more, under the proposal, the ratepayers are required to take the risk of cost over-runs as well as the risk of the irrigators failing to meet their loan obligations. WIN considers this completely unacceptable.

The end result will be ratepayers subsidising irrigators. And on top of all this, the Council, in its February meetings to consider submissions on the dam proposal, effectively ignored the hundreds of public submissions.

We believe that ordinary ratepayers of the District need to be better informed of the real situation and to voice their concerns to their Council representatives before a final decision is made by the TDC in May this year. So we are prepared to give public presentations to every ratepayer association in the District.

Living Legacies

When a loved one dies it is easy to assume that funerals are done in a certain way. Yet there are choices. Lynda Hannah of Living Legacies is available to support individuals and families to understand these choices.

Seventeen years ago, while living in the Graham Valley, Lynda needed to find a way to provide for her family. She knew she wanted to make a difference to the world in a sustainable way. Her background in counselling led her to realise that there was little available to guide people who wanted a family-directed home funeral.

As a result of the research that followed, Lynda set up Living Legacies, the first natural funeral company in New Zealand, as a support and source of information to guide families to make low-cost, environmentally sustainable funeral arrangements. Her aim is to empower people to organise their own funerals. She can advise and assist with the legal requirements, which are surprisingly few, and help demystify an area that is often encountered at a stressful time.

Lynda sees herself as a funeral facilitator, and that the family directs the funeral. Her involvement may be in an advisory capacity, she can walk beside the family as they prepare to farewell their loved one, or she can act as a funeral celebrant, if required.

Prior to speaking with Lynda I was not aware that the Tasman District Council has set aside an area of the Motueka Cemetery as a Natural Burial Park. In this park, unembalmed bodies in biodegradable containers can be buried in shallower graves in a natural burial park and gradually returned to nature.

Lynda asserts that the time to talk about death is when you're young, fit and healthy. Plans can be made to prepare for the inevitable and decisions can be made so that family understand your wishes. Lynda's book, "Living Legacies: A Family Fu-

neral Handbook for an Evergreen World", is a valuable resource for this planning. It is available through the website. Lynda is currently revising the book and preparing it for conversion into an e-book, making it more readily available. 03 528 5220 • info@livinglegacies.co.nz

Living the Lego® Dream

I am sure that many valley residents as they near Motueka have noticed the sign for a Lego[®] gallery, and wondered what lay behind the trees. A recent visit revealed many a child's dream.

In one room of the shed dedicated to things Lego[®], Adrian Barbour designs creations on commission. Using design software, and testing these designs with bricks from his extensive collection, he bridges the gap between the client and their vision of a Lego[®] model that is not commercially available. Once satisfied that the design works, he provides full instructions and a list of the bricks required for the client to complete their model.

The adjacent gallery space is available for families, or small groups to visit. Adrian offers bins of bricks for visitors to build their own creations, or they can view the intricate models he has created, some of which are commercial models, and many are those that he has designed and created himself. If you are a Game of Thrones fan, there is a Lego[®] Cyvasse board game. Those into Star Wars will find various models. It was wonderful to see a very Kiwi creation in the form of a cheeky little fantail kit which Adrian has for sale. For a closer look at the Lego[®] models that Adrian has designed, check out his BrickMonkey MOCs website www.bm-mocs.com. Connecting to his Flickr account through the website gives a greater understanding of the many of the models he has designed and created.

Since moving into the valley Adrian has connected with other Lego[®] enthusiasts in the area. The Christchurch Lego[®] Users Group lent several bins of bricks for use in the Motueka Brick Show in November 2017. Nelson is hosting the event in November this year and these bricks will again

be available for members of the public to construct their own Lego[®] creations. At the Mapua Easter Fair, Adrian and other local enthusiasts gave the public the opportunity to create models in a Lego[®] pit. These bricks are also used at the monthly Lego[®] club at the Motueka library for children 7 years and over. Adrian guides participants in challenges and free building. This club is proving to be very popular, with up to thirty in attendance.

Letter to the editor

Re: Impacts of Forestry on the Separation Point Granite, Roger May, April issue

I would like to offer my congratulations to Roger May on a well thought out article. It is high time that TDC reviewed the way forestry is carried out in this district and the impacts it has on neighbouring land as well as the wider community. Over the years land use has changed, sometimes because markets change (raspberries) and sometimes because what used to be acceptable no longer is. Sheep used to graze on the Tablelands but no more, land used to be cleared and maintained by wild fire burn offs – no more. (some would argue about the disposal of orchard prunings but that is another matter!)

It is time that the way forestry is managed and harvested in this area is revised so the real impact on the local community is taken into account. It is not just the benefits of a few jobs in harvesting and transport but the cost borne by ratepayers to repair the damage to roads and bridges and the damage to our environment. Some years ago farming was blamed for the decline in the trout fishery of the Motueka River. No mention was made of the silting caused by forestry clear felling smothering the larvae of the trout food source. Why has the Tasman Bay scallop fishery declined so rapidly, is it just a co-incidence that the Motueka forests are being harvested?

So many of our forests have been sold off to off-shore owners who reap the major benefits from the sales. It is high time that New Zealand stopped being a low cost producer of commodities and focussed on value added, higher cost end products. Forestry is certainly ripe for this makeover! Higher value means higher harvesting costs can be borne so harvesting can be done in a way which does not cause the rest of us huge expense thus providing an indirect subsidy to the forestry industry.
