# Better opportunities to build small or second dwellings

Building a small home or second dwelling has been made easier and less costly through recent changes to our planning rules and Development Contributions policy. The changes apply to both urban residential and rural areas.

#### **Rural areas**

Changes to the rules for Tasman's rural zones provide landowners with a new opportunity to build a second minor free-standing dwelling, as an alternative to a second housekeeping unit attached to the main house.

The level of resource consent you need for a second minor dwelling is lower than the consent you would need to build a second principal dwelling. You don't need to subdivide to do this (in fact, the rules discourage it). The size of your minor dwelling must be less than 80 square metres – or 120 sqm if the garage is attached.

The opportunity to build a second housekeeping unit attached to your main house has also become more flexible. The unit can now be any size, where previously the floor area was limited to 60 sqm.

The changes also allow for two sleepouts for every main house on a property. Plan Change 60, Rural Land Use and Subdivision introduced these provisions into the Tasman Resource Management Plan.

#### Motueka Valley Business Profile Hahn Decorators: a family affair

Father and daughter, Tony and Chantel Hahn, make up the Hahn Decorators team. Their skills with wallpaper was in particular demand as EQC and insurance companies replaced 'like with like'. If the room had wallpaper prior to the damage requiring repair, it would need to be wallpapered in order to return it to its original condition.

Services offered by Hahn Decorators include internal and external painting, including roof painting, water blasting, wallpapering, and spray painting, redecorating and new builds. Their talents are available to landlords for repairs and redecoration of rental properties.

Tony and Chantel's skills complement each other. They work closely together, usually on the same job. Chantel lives in Stoke and may attend to small jobs in that area, while Tony may undertake this type of work in the valley and Motueka area. At times a client may prefer a female working in their home for cultural reasons

and Chantel is able to meet these needs.

Following the weather event in February they undertook some work to repair damage to houses from the storm. Flood and fire damage often require their skills.

Hahn Decorators offer free quotes for their services and work closely with the client to ensure satisfaction. # Gita smashes the South Island

# Six months on

It's been close to six months since the weather event that was ex-cyclone Gita blew through our district. Most in the valley have been affected in some way, some more than others. While a lot has been done to repair the damage wrought in February, much still remains to be done.

The road repair crews that were a feature of our travels now seem to have gone, but the roads have not been returned to their pre-event state. Road cones have been left in some places, so we slow down to negotiate the rutted surfaces. Paddocks are still peppered with boulders that defy the notion that water could move them to their resting places. Grass struggles its way towards the light through silt. Houses await repair, or at least a decision on what will happen in the future. We wonder about the hillsides that are littered with what remains when the trees have been harvested. For some, Gita is distant and only remembered when travelling through the valley. For others, their lives have been forever changed: their loved house has gone, their land has been changed, and possibly their love of the river has altered. Perhaps worst of all, are those who now live in limbo as they wait for decisions about what will happen as they attempt to return to a semblance of normal life. Many of these things are familiar to anyone who experienced the South Island earthquakes since 2010.

Disasters affect people in different ways, and the type of disaster affects communities differently.


A death in a car accident will have an enormous impact on the immediate family and friends of the deceased. It is a personal tragedy that a community may be aware of because they know someone who knows the family, they heard the sirens, they are a member of the first response team, their fences have been smashed, they drove past the wrecked car, or they read about it in the ghoulish reporting of the latest road accident statistics.

A weather event, like ex-cyclone Gita affects everyone while it is raging through the district. The worry about the combination of wind, and rain as we watch and wait are experienced by most in the community. Proximity to streams and rivers, knowledge of the past, heights of floor levels, and other factual information increase or decrease individual's concerns.

Since moving into the district I have met many fellow Cantabrians who also moved following the earthquakes. Conversation still turns to our experiences. We all have stories to tell because we all felt the earth move. I have only heard of one person who wasn't woken by the first big shake. Many of us tell horror stories about dealing with EQC or insurance companies. Nearly eight years later, some are still waiting for someone to decide their fate.

There is nothing that communities can do to prevent earthquakes and heavy rain and high wind. Our strength as communities is in our ability to rally to support each other in times of disaster and to share our stories. We can also look at the things that made the disaster worse than it needed to be and work towards putting those things right so that the next time a tropical cyclone is headed our way we have less to be concerned about.






