Aiyanna Sophie

Find Joy and Live Your Best Life

On Wednesday mornings in the Ngatimoti community rooms Aiyanna Sophie holds Yuan Qigong classes. She started them in 2010, before taking some time overseas, and resumed on her return about three years ago.

Many of you may not know the meaning of the words, Yuan Qigong. I had the pleasure of meeting Aiyanna at her home in the valley to find out. Yuan Qigong, pronounced "chee gung", is part of Ren Xue®, which is a study of human life based on the wisdom and culture of China, and teaches essential core principles of health, well-being and happiness. The purpose of Yuan Qigong is to work with the body's qi, or life force. Acupuncture also works with the qi, but Aiyanna's experience and study has shown her that Yuan Qigong has the potential to work with this qi at a deep level.

Through Yuan Qigong Aiyanna helps people who want to make a leap forward in life, to unravel the deeper causes of their problems and transform them, and uplift their health and well-being. Problems can be physical or emotional issues, such as fatigue, pain, disease, stress, anxiety, or difficult life challenges. She also supports people who feel stuck and want to understand life



better, and those who want to learn how to help and heal themselves. She is passionate about supporting people to transform pain, trauma, emotions, and self-limiting thoughts and beliefs, and to use their potential to gain inner freedom, autonomy, and self-reliance.

Aiyanna comes with an impressive list of experience and qualifications in health and healing. She started with naturopathy and acupuncture, before graduating as a medical doctor through Otago University. From there she chose to discontinue her registration as a doctor, trained in kinesiology, and started practising as a natural therapist. Yoga, Meditation, and Tai Chi, are also practices that she has studied, as well as being a Qigong Master Teacher and Therapist.

Aiming to support people to strengthen their natural self-healing powers, Aiyanna works in groups, or individual sessions. Current group sessions are running at the Ngatimoti Community Rooms, and in Motueka at the Riverside Community; the venue for individual sessions can be the client's home, or elsewhere by arrangement.

We'll Weather the Weather

In the mid-18th century Samuel Johnson wrote that when "two Englishmen meet, their first talk is of the weather." The same could be said of two Kiwis meeting. Perhaps it is because we were colonised by the United Kingdom that we've continued the habit. The country's first name, Aotearoa, is usually translated to mean land of the long white cloud. We live on an island with only a narrow strip of land to buffer us from the rain and to steady the winds. Whatever the reason, when we meet talk invariably turns to the weather.

The last two summers have given us weather that couldn't be more diverse. Last year Cyclone Gita arrived weakened from its full strength, but still managing to wreak havoc throughout the district. Some people are still suffering in its aftermath while they battle to reconcile their homes. Others may have reinstated their land but are left less confident in their properties and with apprehensions about future flood events. Many are concerned about the impact of forestry practices and what we, as citizens, can do to prevent the damage caused by the combination of slash, rain and gravity, or how to hold the companies responsible for the damage caused.

If only we could have had some of that rain this year. The drought may no longer be the threat that it was a few weeks ago, but I'm sure we are all still keeping a close watch on our water supplies and are acutely aware of the damage that fire can do. The aftereffects of the fires will continue for some time to come.

I'll leave the discussion about the cause of the unusual weather, and if it proves climate change, to the experts. According to NASA: "The difference between weather and climate is a measure of time. Weather is what conditions of the atmosphere are over a short period of time, and climate is how the atmosphere "behaves" over relatively long periods of time."

As a recent arrival to the district I am still learning the weather patterns here. I know the patterns in Canterbury and can read the clouds to have a fair idea of what the day might bring. Those who have lived in the valley for a long time are better equipped to know if the last two summers are as unusual as they seem to this newcomer.

Sitting down to watch the weather presenter on television was part of the evening ritual in many families. Often farmers time

Our RIVER values of respect, positivity, innovation, excellence and responsibility are the cornerstones to what we at Ngatimoti School believe make for a good learner as well as a great community member. In the wake of the recent tragedy in Christchurch, it seems especially important to come back to these values. Respect for diversity, even for seemingly small things such as children who prefer different clothes or a different food could be discussed at home and at school. This should develop into a growing understanding of respect for all people. Stepping in and having conversations about respecting others, and what is ok and what is not ok to be playing, saying or doing is an important part of parenting and of teaching. To quote L.R. Knost, *Our job is not to toughen our children up to face a cruel and heartless world. Our job is to raise children who will make the world a little less cruel and heartless.*

We are always looking for ways to develop our te reo skills and this term we have River Seligman, a tutor for Te Ataarangi, teaching a series of lessons in each class.

Last year there was discussion amongst students about the safety of our roads, and arising from this Mrs Milnes ran an Enviro Group designing signs. As well as hearing from Mr Laufkotter, a local professional sign designer, students all designed ideas for signs and sent them to Tasman District Council in the hope they would be displayed on some of the roads around Ngatimoti. This work has now paid off, and our signs are currently in production. Here is just one example. Well done to all involved - let's hope this makes drivers a little more aware on our roads.



As the 2018 Festival was super successful, an increase from last year's donation was possible as a result and it was agreed to donate \$45,000 to Ngatimoti School. 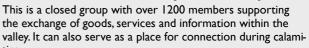

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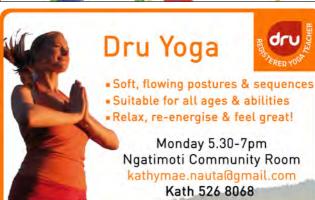
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
