Ngatimoti children have a message for drivers

A series of road safety signs designed by Ngatimoti School pupils have a strong message for drivers – you're not alone on country roads.

In late 2018 teacher Lauren Milnes contacted us with an idea for raising awareness about the different users on country roads after a school parent was injured while cycling.

Many of the local roads around Ngatimoti are narrow and winding. Drivers need to be aware there could be a cyclist around the corner, someone walking their dog or riding a horse.

Council road safety liaison officer Megan Bell headed out to the school to meet the children, who said they wanted to create colourful signs with a point of difference. Working with local sign-writer Peter Laufkotter, the students designed signs to help keep their roads safer.

Megan helped them identify good locations for the signs, and organised their installation.

Lauren says: "The students led this project and were grateful to see that their voices were heard. We really hope these signs make a difference to those that live on and use the roads in the Motueka Valley. We hope no one else gets hurt!"

We think they're a great reminder we all need to 'share the road'.

Ngatimoti Recreation Reserve and Community Rooms

The musing and articles that I write each month for the MVA newsletter are part of my exploration of the place we have chosen to call our home. I had what I thought was a simple idea: to find out what the community rooms were used for and who could use them. I was curious about the existence of two community facilities in Ngatimoti and endeavoured to find out more. A meeting with two members of the Ngatimoti Recreation Reserve Committee, Lesley Hadley and Sarah Bradshaw, sparked my curiosity and led to me perusing the internet to check the facts, making me realise that this was a more complicated story than I had initially thought. With a looming deadline I could not dive as deep as I might wish to find the detailed history of the establishment of these facilities. This is what I found out, with apologies if some of the details are inaccurate.

In 1952 the Ngatimoti Memorial Hall was built to commemorate the men and women from the District who served in WWII. Many rural communities used funds available for public memorial projects to build similar halls. In the 1950s and 1960s these halls were the meeting places for the district and many gatherings were held. Apparently the Ngatimoti Hall boasts a sprung floor which must have made the dances of those years a pleasure. As times have changed and entertainment is found elsewhere these halls are no longer the central gathering place they once were. With a rated capacity of 250 persons it is still the only facility in Ngatimoti able to cater for large groups.

A series of events led to the Ngatimoti Recreation Reserve and Community Rooms coming into existence. Regulations needed to be satisfied to provide for recreation areas to be set aside as determined by the population. In 2005 the Tasman District Council passed a resolution to deem that 1.2ha of the land beside the school be a recreation reserve. Along with the land, the community rooms and a fire station were proposed.

The fire station needed to be moved from its previous site beside the Orinoco, variously called Stream, Creek and River, when it became inadequate to house the new fire engine and the proximity of the Orinoco made it susceptible to flooding. Not a good idea to have the fire service hampered in the event of flooding.

The new buildings were constructed by the Tasman District Council at no cost to the community. There was a proposal at one stage to move the Memorial Hall, but investigations found that this would be too costly. They were officially opened in 2006.

The community rooms are a smaller, more easily heated facility that are used for different purposes than the hall. It has a capacity of 40 people and has well-appointed kitchen facilities, a data projector, as well as the usual tables and chairs. The barbecues just outside the front door are available to the public. If you wish to use these for your function,



you cannot book them for your exclusive use. The reserve is open to the public and can be used by all.

While there are regular bookings, there are slots available for small groups to hold meetings and functions. On the second Wednesday of each month the Motueka Valley Association holds its meetings. Yoga, Yuan Qigong, and other groups use the rooms regularly. Ali Brown, through her Tutoring for Charities Trust, recently hosted an art workshop run by Ariadne Verner. The Motueka Valley Association is looking at hosting a monthly women's craft group in the near future. Look for notification of this in the weeks to come. The rooms are also a great place to host a birthday party.

Groups where the participants pay to attend incur a fee of \$1 per head per hour. A koha is an acceptable contribution from other groups.

The Ngatimoti Recreation Reserve Committee is looking for interested valley residents to join them in their work. The next project they will be undertaking is to plant the southwest fence line. The Fire pit Pump Track and Dirt Jump Park opened in 2011 and is in need of some maintenance by someone with the enthusiasm for the sport.

Defibrillators in the valley

Like many people I thought that heart attack and cardiac arrest were the same thing. It was only when a friend suffered a cardiac arrest that I understood the difference. A heart attack is when blood flow to the heart is blocked, and sudden cardiac arrest is when the heart malfunctions and suddenly stops beating unexpectedly. A heart attack is a "circulation" problem and sudden cardiac arrest is an "electrical" problem.

My friend had been feeling unwell and, not wanting to bother her family, had called an ambulance. This was indeed fortunate as upon arriving in hospital she went into cardiac arrest and was saved by the staff with their defibrillator. She was also fortunate that she lived within 10 minutes of the hospital. Things could have been very different had she lived further away, as we do.

It was following this type of event that prompted Glen Davenport, formerly of Doone Cottage, to gather interested people to form the Motueka Valley Defibrillator Group. Glen had hosted many visitors at her B&B since 1980. In 2013, one of her guests suddenly collapsed over breakfast. Glen vividly recalls the fear of that moment and the feeling of helplessness. She knew after calling emergency services no one would be arriving for at least 20 minutes. As most country folk do, she called on a neighbour for help. Between them they tried to care for the man. When St Johns eventually arrived they worked on the man for two and a half hours. As they left, having stabilised the man sufficiently for him to be transported, they suggested that the valley needed to look at getting an AED (Automated External Defibrillator).

Glen was the instigator and driving force behind setting up the Motueka Valley Defibrillator Group. They have creatively raised the funds for three AEDs in the Valley, which are located at:

- Woodstock Automotive (Kerry Hall), 982 Dovedale Road, Woodstock Junction.
- Ngatimoti Community Rooms/Fire Station on the Motueka Valley Highway, next to Ngatimoti School
- Pokororo Hall, on the West Bank Road at corner of Graham Valley Road.

There are ongoing costs for replacement batteries, for which the group continues to raise funds. Now that the AEDs are in place, their locations are available publicly, making it imperative that they are maintained, not only for those who live in the community, but for the many visitors to our district.

The Motueka Valley Defibrillator Group wish to convey the importance of the following information:

- If someone collapses while with you the first thing is to dial 111.
- Follow the instructions of the 111 dispatcher,
- If they say a defibrillator (AED) is needed then send someone for it. If you are alone, call a neighbour or friend to uplift the AED while you attend to the patient.
- If the patient is not breathing you will need to start CPR immediately.
- The AED will TALK to you and tell you what to do. There is also a picture of where to place the pads.
- Keep going with CPR & AED until the ambulance comes. This could save a life.

Cardiac arrest can happen to anyone, no matter how fit or healthy you are, and kills five times the national road toll. AEDs can be used by people with minimal or no training and can dramatically increase a patient's chance of survival.

As well as raising funds for the equipment, the group also organises education in CPR and use of the AED. A list of

people trained in using the AED has been distributed around the community. If you have misplaced yours contact Gloria at the email address below for a new one.

The Defibrillator Group has met its initial goals and several members are now moving from the valley. They wish to ensure that this important work carries on, that the AEDs are maintained, and the training that could save lives continues. If you are interested in being a part of this group, please contact Gloria by email.

My friend now celebrates two birthdays. The one from the day of her birth and the other from the day of her near death. If it weren't for a defibrillator, I would be remembering that day quite differently.
