Motueka Valley Association Newsletter





Going down to the river to cool off in clean and clear freshwater when it's hot is a great privilege and joy. It's a highlight of summer and a tradition in the Motueka valley. Whether it's swimming, kayaking and canoeing, jumping off rocks or a bridge, fishing or white-baiting, we are lucky to have such a river. It is considered one of the best and cleanest in New Zealand.

There are two swimming sites on Motueka River which are monitored by Tasman District Council for bathing water quality and temperature - at Alexander Bluff Bridge and at State Highway 60 Bridge (SH60). The sites are measured weekly over summer November to March every second year. A sample of water is collected for E.coli testing, a thermometer is placed in the water to record temperature and a black disc water quality test is done to measure clarity – that is, seeing how far away a black disc can be seen horizontally through the water. The further away the disc can be seen, the clearer the water.

This summer there have been two high E.coli readings for the river at the SH60 swimming site. On January 28th there was 649mpn/100ml E.coli and then again two weeks later on February 11th there was 548mpn/100ml E.coli. If there's more E.coli than 550mpn/100ml, it is considered a significant health risk. There should be no E.coli found in drinking water to ensure that it is safe for drinking.

E.coli is a bacteria found in human and warm-blooded animals intestines and most strains are harmless. Testing for E.coli is a good indicator of any faecal contamination as it lasts in freshwater for up to four-six weeks. On both occasions when the water was tested again a couple of days later, the E.coli readings had dropped back to a safe detectable level.

"We commonly have spikes like these, due to rainfall or the high tide that pushes water into the debris (eg algae, seaweed or driftwood) at the edges of the waterway or beach. There is a reservoir of faecal indicator bacteria in these debris deposition areas and the high water levels cause it to be released into the water", says Trevor James, TDC's resource scientist.

If there had been two consecutive high readings, warning signage would recommend not to swim or collect shellfish there. The reasons for these spikes in E.coli at SH60 are possibly due to high tides washing dead animals and faecal matter from the banks of the river.

A couple of weeks ago there was another high spike in E.coli in the river water -1300mpn/100ml, this time it was recorded at Alexander Bluff Bridge site. It was after a rain event and again it had cleared when tested two days later.

It is always recommended to wait for a couple of days after rainfall until the river runs clear again before swimming or collecting shellfish. Bathing water quality and temperature sampling results can be viewed on TDC's website (www.tasman.govt.nz/my-region/environment/environmental-data/ swimming-water-quality-data/).



MVA Committee update

From the February MVA meeting:

- Speed limits in the valley: TDC have made decisions on speed changes in the valley. There will be further reviews of rural road speeds in Tasman to come.
- MacLeans picnic area: MVA is putting in a submission to TDC asking for MacLean's Reserve to be managed as a public/recreational reserve.
- Long Term Plan Early Engagement: Council's 10year plan is about to be reviewed, which offers an opportunity to say how we want money spent for the next three years (more about this in newsletter).
- Waimea Dam update: Councillors have had a meeting at the dam site; contractors have done a lot of work, including road works and diverting the river.

Tiny Market in Pangatotara

This is the season of abundance – orchards and gardens overflowing with more than growers can eat.

A Tiny Market has begun in Pangatotara at the corner of the Motueka Valley Highway and Mytton Heights. It runs for just one hour, from 11 to 12 on Saturday mornings. It's stocked with fruit from Atamai community orchard and surplus vegetables from neighbours' gardens. There's a table selling honey and associated skin products and another for home-made soap. Eggs and arts and crafts are on sale too. Prices, of course, are lower than commercial ones.

As well as sales for cash, produce may be swapped. Folk who work in the community orchard's regular working bees benefit from free fruit. Anyone can turn up an hour before the market and help with picking in return for getting fruit at half price. If you want cheaper fruit you can pick your own heritage, no spray, high brix, nutrient dense apples. Come to the Tiny Market between 11 and 11.30am. Bring your own container. You will be given a map indicating what species and where you can pick your apples. Return to the market to weigh in fruit. PYO apples \$1.50/kg.

After the market the fruit is put in the stall at the roadside, available on an honesty basis through the week. We plan to donate surplus to the Salvation Army.

It has proved an excellent opportunity for neighbourly conversations over free tea and cookies. The market was conceived as a way of both exchanging produce and of bringing the community together. Strengthening the local economy and community resilience were additional aims. It turns out to be a schooling in entrepreneurship for the children in the community as well. At each market there have been child vendors – home-made greeting cards, chocolate cake, guinea pig cuddles and plaited flax bookmarks have been for sale. A conversation was recently overheard where the children were discussing pricing arrangements, and doing a market comparison of variants of a product!

Anyone is welcome to be a vendor at the Tiny Market. Buyers need to bring their own containers. And, of course, we welcome buyers. Time your trip to Motueka to drop by for a cuppa between 11 and 12 on Saturday mornings. Buy your next treat from a nine-year-old!

Farmers 4 Whio

Farmers for Whio is a local valley trapping group made up of landowners, bird lovers and trapping enthusiasts, with the aim of restoring healthy whio (blue duck) populations in our streams and rivers. Whio were once a common site in the valley, but are now an endangered bird with less than 700 breeding pairs estimated in the South Island.

We have made a start to our trapping programme, with initial efforts being concentrated on the Baton, Pearce and Graham Rivers, and the Motueka River in between. The main target species are rats and stoats. The trapping of these pests will not only help our vulnerable whio but all of the native birdlife in our area.

We have recently received a grant from the WWF Community Conservation Fund to invest in more traps. If anyone is interested in volunteering for a trap building session I would be keen to hear from you! This would involve building/assembling trap boxes to house the new traps.

Also, if there is anyone who would like to volunteer to take on a future trapline that would be great too. This would involve checking a series of traps monthly throughout the year (fortnightly during the whio breeding & moult stages). Please email me at farmersforwhio@gmail.com.

There have recently been a few reports of whio sightings in different locations in the valley. It is important that we have a record of as many sightings as possible to help monitor where our whio populations are and identify priority areas for trapping.

Whio sightings can be reported by logging on to www.ebird.org, which is a large international birdwatching group/ website. Alternatively you can contact me on the email address above and I can do this for you. Please include the date, time, location and number of birds.

For those interested, we also have a small facebook group, Farmers for Whio. This is a place for the Motueka Valley community to share whio news, pictures and sightings, keep up to date with latest trapping progress and connect with other keen whio folk.

Have your say about our parks and reserves by 31st March

Tasman District Council manages, that is looks after, many public reserves in our area. There are 155 in the Moutere-Waimea Ward and Council are currently reviewing their management plan, as they are for Motueka Ward. They are seeking our help to plan for the future of our parks and reserves and would like to hear what we love about the reserves, which reserves we use regularly, what we value most about them, whether they could be improved in any way, any changes we'd like to see in the way they are used or managed, and what our long-term vision is for the reserves, as in how we'd like them to be in 10-20 years.

Parks and reserves within our Moutere-Waimea ward are places like the Ngatimoti Hall Reserve, Peninsula Road Recreation Reserve, Ngatimoti Recreation Reserve, Ngatimoti Esplanade Reserve – see map. Other places are Aranui Park, Hoddy Estuary Park, Lord Rutherford Park, Faulkners Bush, along with recreation reserves at Dovedale, Upper Moutere, Kina Beach, McKee (Ruby Bay), Grossi Point, Waimea West, Brightwater, Wakefield, Wai-iti, Lee Valley and other locations.
