Thanks to Motueka Arts Council's Winter Workshops programme, a group of eight are learning to make music with Marimbas. For four weeks, Sunday afternoons at Ngatimoti Memorial Hall Bridgit Knowles is tutoring the group in the art of Marimba playing.

Bridgit, who lives in Pangatotora, has been playing Marimbas for twenty three years. She is a former member of Chimuka, an eight-piece Marimba band directed and taught by Russell Matthews. Bridgit acknowledges Russell who, with his band Mweya, first brought the Marimba to Golden Bay and the area.

The Marimba is a percussion instrument made up of a set of wooden bars which are struck with mallets to produce musical tones. Underneath the bars, pipes or resonators are suspended to amplify their sound. Originating from the Shona people of Zimbawe, Marimba is an ancient word meaning 'many tongues'. It is considered the main expression in the west of the thumb piano or 'Mbira', the Shona's primary instrument.

At the second Sunday lesson, one of the group participants, Amara Jane from Mapua, says that after the first session she loved it: "I found it therapeutic too, particularly the depth and vibration of the bass notes. It is a grounding and healing experience." Beth Bryant, from Motueka, another participant, reiterates these feelings: "...And it's good for memory and coordination, a physical workout and great fun."

Bridgit was really pleased that the workshop members had ended up with a song after their first session. Following their lesson, some of the group stayed on to listen to an open performance practice by the local band Zambuko.

Meaning 'bridge' in the Shona language, Zambuko formed six years ago after the first 'Marimba for Beginners' course was run by Motueka Arts Council and tutored by Bridgit: "We chose 'Zambuko' as our name to acknowledge the bridges over the Motueka River linking the East bank with West bank (our band members come from both sides) but also bridging the Shona world to our valley and region through music, and linking the previous marimba bands to our current band."

Zambuko has members from the Motueka Valley and also further afield - Mapua, Moutere. They practice most Sundays. Bridgit says: "Our practices have us stopping and starting a lot of songs while we learn them and get them up to performance standard...lots of stopping and starting and repeating a phrase over and over..."

Celia Bulman, another of the founding members of Zambuko, says she gets a high from playing the marimba: "...lt's so accessible as an instrument. I love it, it's great fun. It makes me happy being in a group with other people. It's also incredibly good for the brain."

As a group, Zambuko recognise how the experience of playing the marimba is 'undeniably joyful and simultaneously soulful' and has enriched their lives. While understanding that the music is the heart and soul of the Shona people, Zambuko says that the songs they play are for dancing, meditating or both; for connecting to one's ancestral heritage and for uplifting and nourishing the spirit.

The band has played at different venues over the years - Ngatimoti Festival, Kai festival, Evolve and at Luminate last year. Their next performance will be at Steiner Spring Fair Sunday 25th September.

Growing Food

With a thermos of Nettle, Lemon Balm and Sage, it's time to talk Spring and growing food with Fran. Fran Deech, who lives in Greenhill Road, Ngatimoti, is passionate about sharing her knowledge of growing food as well as growing medicinal plants. About two years ago, Fran and I spoke about her wanting to share her wide knowledge of medicinal plants. Since then, Fran has connected with several people and has a core group of gardeners who gather regularly to learn from Fran and share their experiences. As plants are coming out of dormancy with the energy of Spring, Fran is wanting to let people know that she's still keen to continue sharing her knowledge and her experiences of growing food and medicinal plants in this climate: "There's a deeper purpose for me than just

"There's a deeper purpose for me than just growing plants and food for myself, especially the way the world is at the moment, and I want to share what I know."

Learning about medicinal plants started for Fran with a 'Wild Women and Weeds' course run by Phillipa Rutherford at the Chandrakirti Meditation Centre. Phillipa was her inspiration and Fran started growing medicinal plants in her small urban garden in Nelson. Wanting to know more, Fran studied at Canterbury College of Natural Medicine in Christchurch. There she learnt more specifically about preparing the plants and making tinctures and ointments from them which she continues to do.

Fran has lived at the Ngatimoti property for four years. She lost her home and garden in Shaggery Road on the West Bank from the devastating damage caused by Cyclone Gita in 2018: "I'm still in awe of how I got to be here," she says," It's a sanctuary, quite wonderous, and I feel very fortunate to have good neighbours and be able to connect with them on a heart level."

Fran will be 77 this year, and considers ageing an interesting process, very humbling and important to stay present: "I don't want to be considered an expert, I'm on a huge learning curve too, and as before, I'm wanting to connect with people who want to learn."

"Preparing the garden, making compost, and knowing when to sow your seeds. It's all a question of timing...perpetual spinach needs to be sewn after Summer solstice, I sow my parsley seeds the last week of August, and having a greenhouse makes a difference."

"It's so important for me to share what I know, basic knowledge about growing vegetables. I'm getting food for myself and I want to give seedlings away and share with others, "she says.

Cycle Trail

It's been delay delay with the cycle trail lately. A little bit of progress coming to keep us all interested though.

The contract has been let to upgrade the Pokororo swingbridge. The sides will be raised to 1.2m from the current 0.9m to make it safer for cyclists. The engineers suggested doing anything further (higher sides, wider deck) may compromise the structural integrity of the Bridge to the extent a new bridge would likely be necessary \$\$.

The trail building team will be back on the trail next week, cleaning up the flood damage (thankfully not much) and tidying up the trail sections that have been started.

We did manage to put the trail and rail up opposite the former Dunbar Estate so a victory there! We are still waiting for the bridges to be consented and for lwi approval for continued river work (our fault – we had been breaching our consent!).

Hoping for a summer opening but unable to give firm dates at this stage. - Thanks for your patience.



Catchment Facilitator Role

The Motueka Catchment Collective submitted an application for three years funding from the Ministry of Primary Industries for the MCC in early August and await the outcome as to whether it is successful. If it is, then the Collective is looking to recruit a Catchment Facilitator in the Spring.

The job would be along the lines of a catchment coordinator role and could be done by one person or by two as part-time. The first year is a preparatory phase for the Collective with the second & third years being more of establishment & consolidation of initial actions, so will be dependant on the outcome of the first year.

The role/s would be to support sub-catchment groups & activities, facilitate thematic groups based on community priorities already identified, work with key Collective partners, establish a strong monitoring framework and meet planning & reporting requirements.


NGATIMOTI SCHOOL NEWS - September 2022
